Newly elected Chairman of the Select Board Joe Dicton said there was good attendance at the Monday night, March 2 Town Meeting held at Rutland Town School. "We as a board tried to be very transparent with the budgets. There were good discussions on the proposed uses of the surplus funds discovered earlier this year. We commend the residents for coming to Town Meeting and also for voting to support all funding requests and allocations on Tuesday, March 3."

The Board welcomed Paul Clifford who ran unopposed for the 3 year seat of retiring chairman, Steve Hawley. Dicton noted that Clifford's experience in the 1990's as Alderman in the City of Rutland, and later as the Street Dept. Supervisor for the Dept. of Public Works will serve the town well. He joins the Intermunicipal Committee working on issues that affect both City and Town.

Funding to construct a new town Highway Garage was approved by voters in March. Dicton said the Board is "moving forward by applying for an amended Act 250 permit from the District Environmental Commission to allow the construction of this additional building at the town's property at Northwood. Unfortunately, the discussion seems to be moving away from putting us on a sustainable path. The structure of state government cannot be maintained without significant tax increases. We are a tale of two states. The Burlington area has seen significant job growth since the Great Recession but the rest of the state has seen prolonged economic stagnation. Rutland County, and for that matter, the southern four counties have seen a decline in total jobs.



The House recently passed their budget proposal. We continually hear how there are significant cuts, but the harsh reality is that it is a 4.7% increase in state spending. This is not sustainable and it is coupled with the largest tax increase in recent memory. In addition there is significant use of one-time monies that will result in us being back next year to raise additional revenues. In addition, the House budget does not include their proposal to clean our waters which will result in the necessity for an additional \$8 million in needed revenues, nor does it include the revenue source for any healthcare cost-shift reduction.

A few years ago the legislature overrode Gov. Douglas' veto of the budget and passed a larger budget than the state could afford. If you use the rate of inflation and grew the budget from the Douglas proposal over the last five years we would not need any revenue increase this year. I believe it is the highest priority to put the state back on a sustainable path. I am hopeful that the Legislature will have the wisdom to make the necessary decisions to do that.

The Rutland delegation has been working diligently to save the PSAP (public service answering point) positions at the Rutland barracks. We have made some progress but have not reached a solution that the administration will agree with. We will continue to work to find common ground to protect these jobs and the public safety.

911 Locatable Addressing and Cell Phone Calls By Joseph Zingale Jr., 911 Coordinator

It can happen at any time and it could happen to you. If you ever find yourself in a situation where you need emergency service such as fire, police or ambulance, you will probably dial 911. But how will you call 911? Will you use your so called land line phone or will you use your cell phone?

If you use your land line the emergency responder will automatically know your location because your call will carry a three number code unique to land lines in Rutland Town. That is how a 911 dispatcher will know a call from a residence on the Creek Road with a North Clarendon mailing address is in the Town of Rutland and not in Clarendon, which has a different three digit code.

A serious problem could occur if a Town resident calls 911 from a cell phone or from a computer using a program such as Skype, neither of which carries the three digit Rutland Town code, and the individual correctly gives their address as being XXX Creek Road, North Clarendon, VT.

The 911 dispatch could possibly call out Clarendon Emergency services when in fact Town of Rutland services should have received the dispatch. Such confusion could result in the delay of emergencv services.

Unlike other communities, Rutland Town residents have several zip codes 05701, 05736, 05759 and a couple other zip codes. It is very important that any Town resident with a 05759 zip code using a cell phone make it very clear to the 911 call taker that they are in the Town of Rutland even though their mailing address is XXX, Cold River Road, North Clarendon, VT.

Remember, if you make a 911 call with your cell phone, your exact location will not be known to the person at the other end of the phone.

From Byron Hathaway, Road Commissioner

I would like to take this time to thank the voters for their support of the highway budget at the March town meeting election day. Your support is very much appreciated.

Green Up Day this year is on Saturday, May 2. Bags will be available at the Town Office and the Transfer Station. Bags that have been filled with road-side trash can be brought to the Transfer Station on Green Up Day only between the hours of 8 am to noon. If bags have to be left at the roadside please call the Highway Department answering machine at 773-8128 and leave a message saying where the bags have been left. The Highway Department will pick them up on the following Monday.

Woody debris that fell into the Town's ROW during the December ice storm will be picked up by the highway crew. There will be some reimbursement from FEMA for this cost.

A new precast concrete box culvert will be installed early this summer by Casella Construction on Prospect Hill near the intersection with East Pittsford Road. A VTrans structures grant will pay for 80% of the cost of construction. The road will have to be closed for up to a week to facilitate the installation work. **Keep an eye on Front Porch Forum for announcements.** (Read more about Front Porch Forum on Page 9.)

We need your input. A committee has been formed to write a complete streets plan for Rutland Town. Complete streets is a law passed by the legislature several years ago. What it means in a nutshell is all users of the road (trucks, cars, bicycles and pedestrians) must be considered when a road is reconstructed. The committee is conducting a survey to gather public input. You can respond to the survey by going to the following website and filling out the survey online. There is no cost to you. The site is at www.surveymonkey.com/s/9NPZP62. Be sure to use the full address with the seven digit code at the end. Thanks for your help. This link will also be posted on Front Porch Forum for you convenience. Please take the time to participate in the survey.

The voters approved a ballot item setting aside some money for a highway department garage. The next step is to select a general contractor to design and build the garage. At the April 7 Select Board meeting, the selectmen voted to put the facility out to bid subject to voter approval at a mid-July special election. A firm, not to exceed price for the garage will be voted on at that time. Construction will start after that. Again keep an eye on Front Porch Forum for announcements and information.

Happy Spring to all Town Residents! Warmer weather means that the third and final installment of Property Tax is due on or before May 10, 2015. Because the due date falls on a weekend, the Town Treasurer will accept taxes brought in to the Town Treasurer's office on Monday, May 11th as on time. Tax payments with a valid U.S. Postal Service postmark of May 10th will also be considered on time. Please do NOT drop your tax payment in the outside mailbox after hours, as doing so is illegal by federal law!

The Town Clerk and Treasurer's Office is now open Monday through Thursday, 8:00 - 4:30 pm, and Friday 8:00 until Noon. We are using Friday afternoons to transition to the NEMRC accounting system on our computers. Once the new system is in place, it will make paying taxes and tracking accounts easier and more accurate. This will also make paying taxes more efficient when you include the barcode stub with your payment. With a wave of the wand, your tax payment will be recorded! So don't forget to include the bar code payment stub from your tax bill with your payment! Thank you!

The RTS Rock Climbing team led by coach Hunter Berryhill are the Scholastic Indoor Rock Climbing League Vermont State Co-Champions for 2015! Coach Berryhill reports: "Climbing against fellow SIRCA West teams Mill River and Rutland Middle, RTS also squared off against the best SIRCA East had to offer: Sharon Academy, Woodstock, and SIRCA East Champion, Richmond.

Despite climbing without the SIRCA East's top male climber, RTS climber Dylan Roussel, the RTS climbers attacked an onsite competition with intensity and dedication, racing the clock to complete challenging climbs they had never before attempted. barracks on McKinley Ave. The proposal would also close the Derby, VT center and consolidate operations at the two remaining sites in Williston and Rockingham. Dicton said that although the date is not set, and in fact was delayed until September, closing of the local dispatch branch is inevitable. "The Select Board feels the action will impact us both in fire and police protection. In preparation, the Board and officers of the police and fire departments will meet jointly starting this month to address concerns and keep communication lines open. Meetings may later involve other agencies and communities if need be."

Recent news of the sudden passing of Anthony 'Tony' Flory March 23 shocked and saddened town residents. He was at the Transfer Station as usual on Saturday, two days before. It was a normal day where Tony greeted all who came through and bantered with them about town news, more personal headlines, and of course the weather.

Chairman Dicton at the Select Board meeting the next day called for a moment of silence in honor of Tony. He then shared a long list of the offices and positions Flory held during his 40 year career in service to the town.

The BJ's Wholesale Club store south of the Holiday Inn is moving closer to reality. On Friday, April 3, the District #1 Environmental Commission ruled that the project complies with new Act 250 criteria discouraging strip development. The Commission found that the project is being built in an area that is already heavily developed with commercial uses, and that recent modification to the project actually decreased strip development characteristics. Dicton said that the Select Board, Planning Commission and local House and Senate leaders "support the project very strongly."

Development of a large scale Cold River Road solar farm was approved recently by the Vermont Public Service Board. The Town's objection to the Hearing Officer's initial ruling favorable to the developer was denied. Residents in the vicinity of the proposed solar installation may decide to further appeal the ruling on their own, but the town has taken no position on a future course of action related to the decision.

3SquaresVT

3Squares VT is a USDA funded program that can help seniors to purchase nutritional foods and stretch their monthly food budget. According to Hunger Free Vermont 6,600 senior struggle with food insecurity.

Originally called the Food Stamp program, it has changed a lot over the years. Seniors 65 and over can have their benefits directly deposited into their checking or savings account unless they request an EBT card. Anyone who receives the benefit and is 60 or older but not yet 65 will receive the benefits in the form of an EBT card. This can be used at the grocery store or local Farmers Markets like any other debit or credit card.

The amount of the benefit is based upon income, expenses, and household size. If your medical expenses are more than \$35 a month and not covered by medical insurance they can be deducted from your gross income, resulting in a higher benefit for you. For example, copayments for medications and doctor's appointments, and premiums for health insurance are all allowable deductions. According to AARP the average a senior spends \$5,000 a year on medical expenses; \$3,200 on medical insurance, \$935 on medical services, \$800 on prescription and over the counter drugs, and \$200 on medical supplies.

Feeding America reports that food insecure seniors are at increased risk for chronic health conditions, even when controlling other factors such as income:

- © 60 percent more likely to experience depression
- © 52 percent more likely to develop asthma
- of congestive heart failure


The number of food insecure seniors is projected to increase by 50% when the youngest of the Baby Boom Generation reaches age 60 in 2025.

Many Vermonters do not know that they qualify for 3SquaresVT or that they may also be eligible for Fuel Assistance if they apply for these programs.



FOUR WINDS BLOWING By Kirsten Marsh



Have you ever been 'flagged' by a deer? If you've been spotted by a deer you may notice that they'll stand there, the only movement being twitching ears and flaring nostrils, trying to determine how big of a threat you are. If one decides you might be a predator the 'flag' goes up, i.e. the tail is raised exposing the white fur underneath signaling to the rest of the herd to race for shelter.


In March we learned a lot about the giant herbivores that call Vermont forests home. The Four Winds Institute does a fantastic job of supplying us with various kits for our units of study. We were actually able to handle various deer parts (FWNI uses road-kill animals for science study, no animals were harmed for these activities!) We examined a deer foot (who knew these animals walked around on tiptoes?), antlers, skull and jaw. The students played games showcasing how hard it is to make it through the winter for these animals. They fought over food sources and played predator tag... even though it's just a game, it made the 'prey' nervous!

April finds us outside again listening for the lovely spring songs of our forest birds. Our diverse landscape here in Vermont hosts an amazing number of bird species that come here to nest, somewhere around 200. The mix of hardwood and coniferous forests provides a range of habitats for birds of all types. The forest habitats are categorized into four layers (canopy, understory, shrub & floor), it's amazing how life in all layers works to support each other and the health of the forest itself. We are also learning how to identify some of
