

Thank you, voters! On Town Meeting Day, Rutland Town voters approved all town budgets for fiscal year 2021-22 and all of the requested appropriations for local non-profit organizations. Voters also approved a new depreciation account to provide money for maintenance and repair of equipment at our transfer station. Our town is in good shape and well-funded for the coming year.

Our generous voters also approved \$15,000 for scholarships for our graduating high school seniors who plan to pursue post-graduate education. We urge every senior who has resided in town for at least the last two year to apply. Forms and information can be found on the town's website. The deadline for applications is Friday, April 23 at noon, so get those applications in soon.

Each year following town meeting, the Select Board reorganizes itself. This year we welcomed Don Chioffi, newly elected Select Board member.

Work on designing a pocket park at Center Rutland Falls is happening thanks to a grant from the VT Agency of Commerce and Community Development. The Town Planning Commission is working with the Rutland Regional Planning Commission to determine what should go in the proposed park. To help generate ideas, stakeholder meetings are being scheduled in the coming weeks. That includes a recreation-related group which includes representatives from Green Mountain Power (which owns most of the land that is proposed for the park), Trout Unlimited, Rutland County Audubon, VT Fish & Wildlife and Forest, Parks & Recreation, local Boy Scouts, neighbors, and town department heads.

Since the park site has many ties to Rutland's past, we are also assembling a historyrelated group.

Reopening update from RFL

When the Vermont Department of Libraries scheduled an all-libraries meeting for late March, many of us expected new guidance on how to reopen. Instead, with the growth of COVID-19 cases in Rutland County and statewide, the advice was to stay the course.

In the case of libraries, that means following guidance from the state to restrict access for library users, with curbside service strongly preferred. Libraries that do open are required to record every user's name, phone and email information. Rutland Free is leery of the privacy issues around that, and the building does not have state-of-the-art air handing or filtration, so in an abundance of caution, we're sticking with curbside and online use only, while working on step-by-step plans to reopen, as required by the state for libraries.

Curbside can be ordered by phone at 773-1860, by email to rutlandfree@rutlandfree.org, or by placing holds via the online catalog at https://catalog.rutlandfree.org. Orders for in-stock items are ready no later than the next day. We'll call you when your items are ready to be picked up.

Online borrowing

In the meantime, please check out our online offerings! Demand for downloadable ebooks and audiobooks continues to increase, so we are increasing the number of titles and copies of popular titles we have available. We've also added Kanopy video streaming and Freegal music streaming, which are getting increasing use as well.

I was re-elected as chair and Joe Denardo was re-elected as clerk. We also reestablished subcommittees of the Board so that we can meet in smaller groups to review in detail matters that arise in our departments. All subcommittee meetings as well as full Select Board meetings are open to the public. Notices of upcoming meetings and a list of subcommittee members are on the town's website.

March is the time when the Select Board makes appointments to various posts within local government. These appointed officials play an important role in shaping policy and meeting statutory requirements. Our special thanks go to all those individuals who have stepped up to be delegates to the Solid Waste District and Regional Planning Commission, to Town Planning Commission members, to Fire Warden, Fence Viewers, Town Grand Juror, Emergency Management Director and many others. We appreciate your service.

Work is underway on the construction of the Harbor Freight building in back of Aldi's on Route 7 south. The town has received the necessary permits to construct our equipment storage shed at Northwood Park. And we are moving ahead on paving projects to improve local streets and roads. We deferred paving last spring due to uncertainty over the effect of the pandemic on the town's income. But with revenues staying strong, we have accepted the \$571,603 bid of Fuller Sand and Gravel for road work this spring and summer.

The Select Board met virtually with the managers of the Diamond Run Mall to discuss redevelopment of that site, and also with the developer of a proposed 260-unit housing complex. Both projects have the potential for significant impacts on our tax base and on our town's services. We will continue to monitor progress of these developments.

Earlier this year, our town lost another good citizen. John Socinski was a successful businessman, a member of our Select Board and a generous contributor to many local causes. Our thoughts and good memories go to his wife Janet and to John's family.

Spring 2021 at RTS Tapestry By Lori Mcneil, Site Coordinator

This winter, although different in many ways, has been full of fun and exciting adventures. With all the snow our recess time has been filled with making snowmen, sledding, fort building and other outdoor winter activities. The students have been super busy with a variety of indoor activities this winter, too.

Although indoor activities have been challenging at times the students have adjusted to the changes. Everyone has their own supply box filled with markers, crayons, colored pencils, glue, scissors and playdough, which are easily accessed for individual and group activities. Both groups have learned a lot about sewing this winter and have created items to bring home and to share with different organizations. Almost all students are able to hand sew, use a sewing machine (with assistance), to create items such as scarves, puppets, and blankets. Students have also participated in a variety of crafts and STEM projects as well as some science experiments.

Now with spring around the corner staff and students are looking forward to spending more time outside playing games and running around with their friends. Everyone is excited to build forts in the woods, play tag, kickball, baseball, or just swing. Students will continue to work on sewing projects, spring related crafts and activities, and STEM projects. We will explore various artists' work and try our own hand at some of their techniques. Who knows we might have the next "Picasso" in our program! We also will begin our VerMoney program. This activity-based curriculum will give students a little introduction to wants and needs, saving and spending, and other financial literacy skills.

Our Summer Tapestry plans are already well on the way. This year our theme will be Rutland Town Tapestry "Where The Wild Things Are!" This summer we will unleash your child's love of all animals large and small! We will enjoy the outdoors while learning about the creatures we share our world with. We will play games, make projects, and go on theme related excursions! We are also looking forward to possible field trips and time at Northwood pool!

The dates for our summer camp will be Monday June, 28th through Friday August, 13th. Enrollment forms will be sent home with students in grades K-6 in late March or early April. Sign up quickly to reserve your spot for the summer.

There is still time to sign your children up for the Tapestry Afterschool Program. The program runs Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from school dismissal until 5:30 each day. I would remind everyone that Green-Up Day will be held this year on Saturday, May 1st. Green-Up is an outdoor activity that can be safely done by masking and distancing. In addition, you should wear sturdy shoes, brightly colored clothing, gloves, or a pick-up stick, and walk facing traffic.

Bags will be available at the transfer station during normal operating hours, at the Town Office outside by the front door, or by calling the Highway Department at 773-8128 and I will do my best to either leave them outside the garage for you to pick up or deliver them to you.

Filled, official Green-Up bags may be brought, at no charge, to the Transfer Station on Saturday May 1st, between the hours of 8 am and 12 pm only. If you cannot make it during that time, then you may leave them beside the road.

found. This helps to speed the pick-up
of bags on Monday following GreenUp Day.

April is Volunteer Appreciation Month!
Southwestern Vermont Council on
Aging (SVCOA) is grateful for all of its
volunteers all of the time, but we celebrate
them particularly during April, which is
National Volunteer Appreciation Month.

During the pandemic, SVCOA's volunteer program has showcased just how caring, giving, and committed Vermont volunteers are. The demand for help from isolated older Vermonters rose quickly starting in March of 2020. At that time SVCOA began its volunteer grocery shopping program, a non-contact program that allows at-risk seniors to stay safely home while volunteers do their shopping for them. From its inception in March a year ago until today, there have been 90 grocery volunteers serving twice that many older Vermonters. Not only have the grocery shoppers faithfully shopped for their clients, many have sent cards or given special treats on birthdays or holidays because of the connection they made with their clients.

Another program that started with the pandemic was the phone check-in program. The weekly phone call helps to combat isolation for both the caller and the callee, allows a quick check to identify any client needs, and, in many cases, has produced warm friendships.

SVCOA volunteers follow the state's guidelines and are still not allowed to enter client's homes. However, with warmer weather on the way, it will be possible to meet in person outdoors – on a porch or in the driveway.

Masks must still be worn and social distancing observed, but this outdoor meeting opens the door, so to speak, for other types of volunteering. Clients who need a little help with balancing their checkbook or paying their bills may now request a money management volunteer. Friendly visitors may soon be able to meet outdoors with their clients rather than just phone them.

The need for volunteers will not pass with the passing of the pandemic restrictions! The grocery program is a service that was an undetected need before the pandemic and will continue to be a vital service in the future.

Phone check-in will continue as well as the opening up of friendly visitors, money management, a new push for computer help for older Vermonters, home modifications (ramps, grab bars), indoor chores, office help, tai chi instructors, and meal site coordinators.

Imagination Library

Beginning in February 2021, children from birth to age five living in Rutland Town, Rutland City, Mendon, Tinmouth and Ira can receive a free specially chosen book monthly, thanks to a new collaboration between Dolly Parton's Imagination Library and the Rutland Free Library. Registered children will be mailed a free age-appropriate book addressed personally to them each month, at no cost to their family. (The costs are covered by generous local donations.)

Families can register using the form online at https://imaginationlibrary.com/check-availability/. We've found that the hard copy registration forms can work well, seizing the moment when families first learn about the program.

One question I often get is should I sign up my children to receive for books if I can afford to buy them books. My answer is yes!!! Parents whose children have participated have said how thrilled their children are to receive a book mailed to them in their name! Parents have also raved about the quality of the books, and that the section includes book they wouldn't have bought their child.

A \$30 donation covers all the costs of the program for a child for a year, including mailing new quality books directly to the child monthly for a year. A gift of \$150 will cover the program cost of providing 60 books to a child for the entire five years!
